The Governors of St. Joseph's actively monitor the College's performance, and have recently covered Science, History, Geography, Safeguarding and Special Needs as part of their on-going review of all aspects of the College.

The Governors are very proud of the achievements of the students, who are clearly aiming high in their studies and in sport, performing arts, music, and charitable work, as well as supporting each other generously. It is evident that all staff, including teachers and support staff, have been striving for excellent outcomes. We recognise and value this hard work, collaboration, and community involvement.

The Education Minister's recent call for a nationwide consultation on fair funding for schools highlights the financial pressures which many schools are facing. St. Joseph's is also facing new challenges in the light of reduced funding from the government.

We are looking to introduce an Academic Development Fund which will help us to continue to provide excellent opportunities for our children. We will be providing more information on this in the near future.

We recently met with members of the Senior Leadership Teams and governors of the catholic schools in Swindon and Malmesbury, as part of a gradual move to closer relationships between the schools. This is part of a wider initiative by the Clifton Diocese to enhance collaboration between groups of Catholic schools.


I thought that the Holocaust ceremony was an inspirational event as now I know what happened in the past. The service was brilliant as we got to listen to other people's viewpoints on this event.

### ART and LITERACY

Year 8 Students have been selected and have taken part in a series of lessons using Art to help with their Literacy. Looking at the theme of water, students have been creating their own visual responses and poems, building up their vocabulary based on their own experiences.

Expanding on the theme, students also participated in an Art History lesson where they looked at the famous image "Raft of the Medusa" and created their own newspaper front pages. Based on the water and ship wreck theme, students are also starting to look at contemporary images of refugees and the art that is being produced and creating their own responses.

### **DESIGNAND TECHNOLOGY**

The Spring Term is always the busiest period of time in the Design Technology workshops.



Our GCSE and A Level students have their project deadlines and many of the students will spend

countless extra hours honing and perfecting their practical pieces ready for the final assessment.

Lessons are always busy and the workshops are frequently a hive of activity until 5pm as the students strive to hand in the best work that they can do.



This year the GCSE Resistant Materials Students have been designing and making lighting based on the work of a Design Movement.

Lamps have been designed to work with battery powered LED strips and, as you can see in the pictures, the students have produced some fantastic work. The Year 10 Engineering students have followed technical drawings to manufacture a clamp for their coursework. The students have spent a lot of time, effort and care ensuring that they are manufactured to a high degree of accuracy.



Many of these clamps would be indistinguishable from their commercially sold versions.

The Year 11 Engineering students have worked hard this term creating product designs in CAD software. All designs have been drawn to size and in most cases are so complex, they are made up of a vast number of component parts, each of which is drawn separately and assembled on the screen in the same way you would assemble an Airfix kit.

### Food Room



The food room has been very productive with students cooking meals covering a wide range of cooking skills and techniques.

Savoury snacks, sweat treats and complex dishes have been cooked and it never ceases to amaze us how much effort the students put in to prepare and cook their dishes within the one hour lesson.

### Graphics



The Year 10 Graphics students have had their first taste of meeting a major deadline.

Their brief was to design and make a paper toy that would raise awareness of an environmental issue. As you can see in the photographs, there was a wide range of individual responses to the brief and all students have shown amazing progress in their learning through the course of the project.

### Product Design



The Year 12 Product Design students have completed their design coursework.

This project focuses on a wide range of designing techniques that will set them up for any career in design and also transferable skills which would equipment them for other business sector careers.
